

Anti-Social Behaviour and Violent Sexual Offences Report: Queen's Park Ward

Reported crime incidents up to December 2025

Introduction

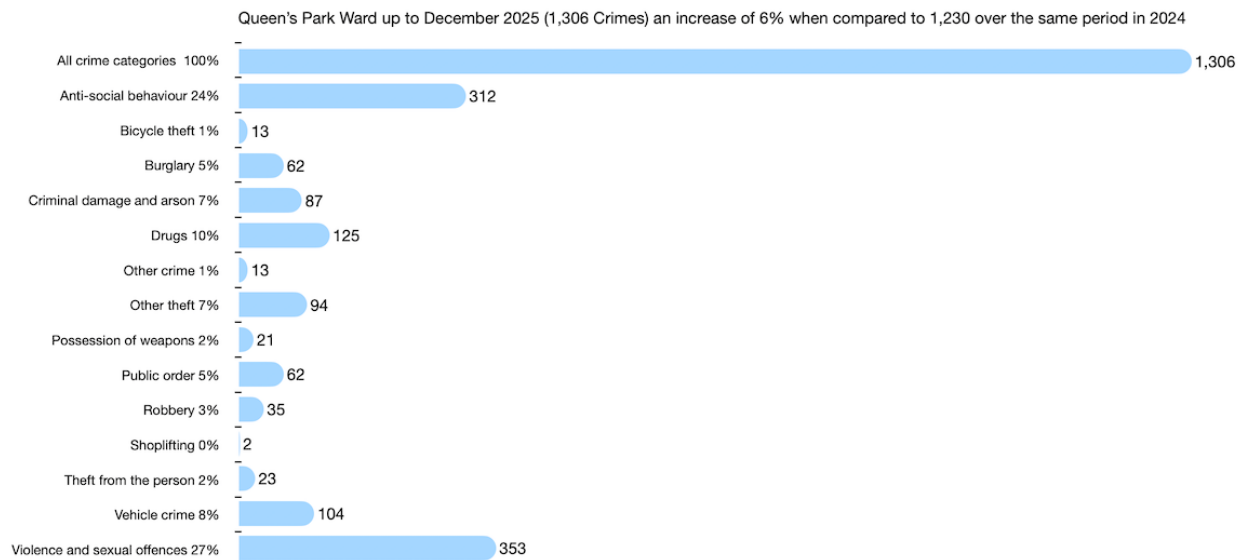
This report presents analysis of Metropolitan Police Service crime data relating to Anti-Social Behaviour and Violent Sexual Offences, sourced from the MetPolice.uk website. This data is used to provide an evidence-based assessment of community safety risks within the Queen's Park Ward. The findings are intended to inform safeguarding practice, support multi-agency working, and guide proportionate prevention and intervention activity by statutory partners and local stakeholders.

Engagement from residents and partner organisations is welcomed. Comments, observations, and proposals for initiatives that may strengthen safeguarding arrangements and reduce harm associated with Anti-Social Behaviour and Violent Sexual Offences can be submitted using the form at the end of this report.

Overall Crime Snapshot

1,306 crimes reported (Jan-Dec 2025) – 6% higher than 2024 (1,230 crimes).

Key Insight: Total crime is trending upward compared to last year.



Crime Trend Analysis Report – Percentage Variation Review

This section looks at how much each crime type changed between its lowest and highest month. This shows which crimes were most volatile during the year.

Very High Difference

Drugs – ↑ 2,350% (from 2 to a high of 49)

Drugs had by far the biggest change. One month recorded a major spike to 49 compared to a low of 2. This suggests a large enforcement operation or a short-term surge in activity.

Burglary – ↑ 500% (from 2 to a high of 12)

Burglary reached levels five times higher than its lowest month. Although it may fall later, there were clear spikes during the year.

Robbery – ↑ 500% (from 2 to a high of 12)

Robbery shows similar sharp increases at certain points, even though overall numbers remain moderate.

Vehicle Offences – ↑ 400% (from 3 to a high of 15)

Vehicle offences had several higher months, showing repeated increases rather than steady levels.

Moderate to High Difference

Criminal Damage and Arson – ↑ 267% (from 3 to a high of 11)

There were noticeable increases in some months, but not as extreme as **Drugs** or **Burglary**.

Vehicle Crime – ↑ 200% (from 4 to a high of 12)

Vehicle crime fluctuated during the year, with some clear peak months.

Violence and Sexual Offences – ↑ 122% (from 18 to a high of 40)

This category more than doubled from its lowest point. Unlike **Drugs**, this increase appears more sustained rather than a single spike.

Anti-social Behaviour – ↑ 118% (from 17 to a high of 37)

ASB shows steady fluctuation throughout the year, with some higher months but no extreme spike.

Shoplifting – ↑ 500% (from 1 to a high of 6)

Although the percentage looks high, this is due to very low starting numbers.

Low Volume / Zero Baseline Categories

For the following categories, the lowest value was zero, so a percentage increase cannot be calculated accurately:

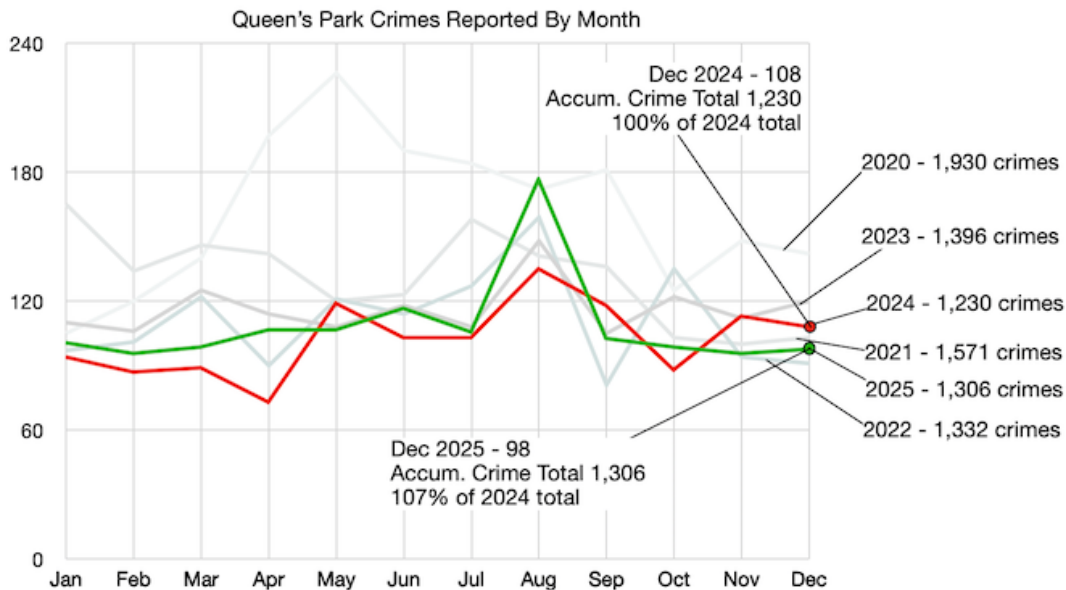
- **Public Order – 0 to 3**
- **Theft from the Person – 0 to 3**
- **Possession of Weapons – 0 to 7**
- **Other Crime – 0 to 1**
- **Other Theft – 0 to 4**

These categories did increase at certain points, but overall numbers remain relatively low.

Overall Summary

- **Most volatile category: Drugs (large single spike).**
- **Sustained high levels: Violence and Sexual Offences.**
- **Notable spikes: Burglary, Robbery and Vehicle Offences.**
- **Steady but fluctuating: Anti-social Behaviour, Criminal Damage and Vehicle Crime.**
- **Low overall volume: Public Order, Theft from the Person, Possession of Weapons, Other Crime and Other Theft.**

Queen's Park Ward Crime Reports by Month



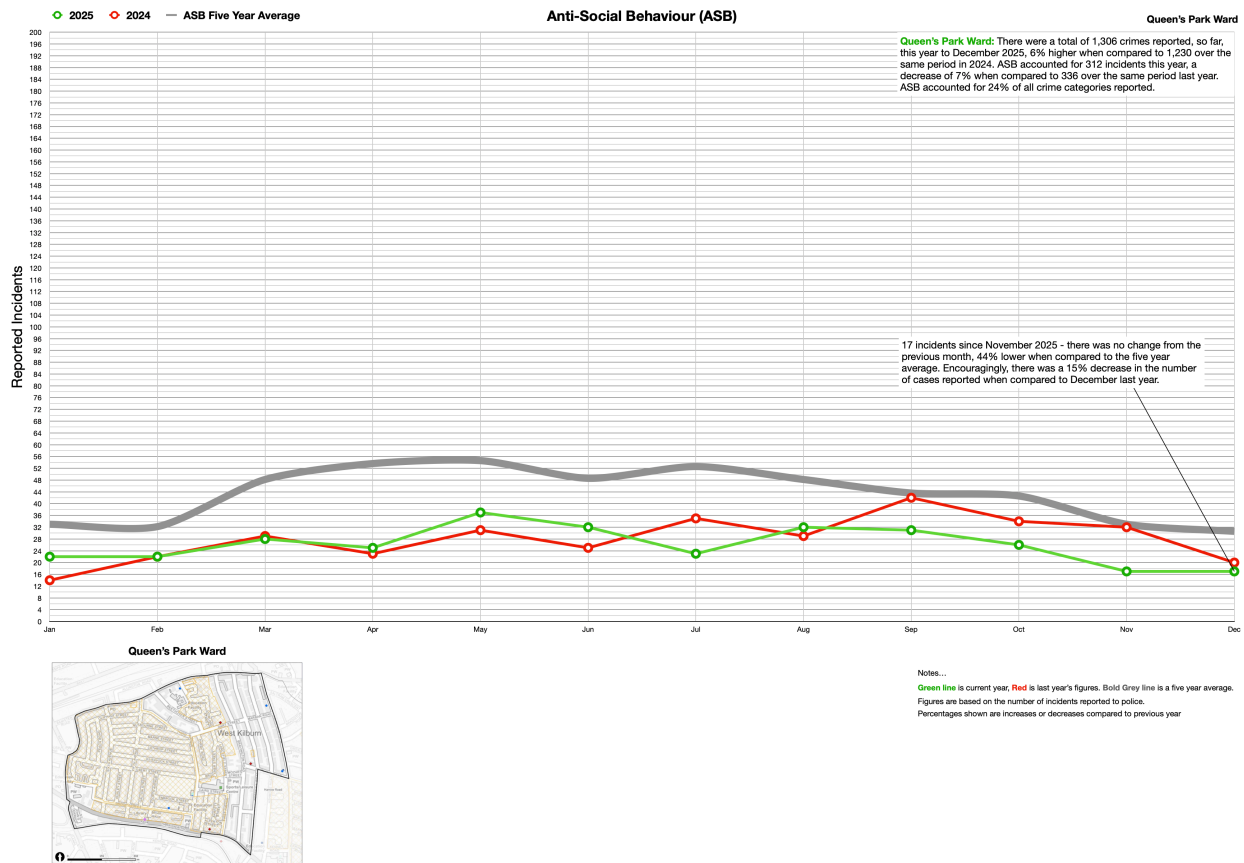
The chart displays monthly reported crimes in Queen's Park and compares multiple years (2020–2025).

The highlighted lines focus on 2024 (red) and 2025 (green), while earlier years appear faded in the background.

Crime in Queen's Park tends to rise in the summer months, reaching its highest point in August. Crime levels were much higher in 2020, but since then they have stabilised at a lower level. Even though 2025 had a higher yearly total overall 6% above 2024, December itself was slightly lower than the previous year.

Crime reports fluctuate throughout the year, with a noticeable peak in August. Although 2025 had slightly fewer crimes in December compared to 2024, the overall yearly total for 2025 was higher. Crime reports remain significantly lower than in 2020, suggesting that while there are seasonal increases, overall crime reporting has stabilised in recent years.

Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB)



The chart above illustrates data using the following colour system:

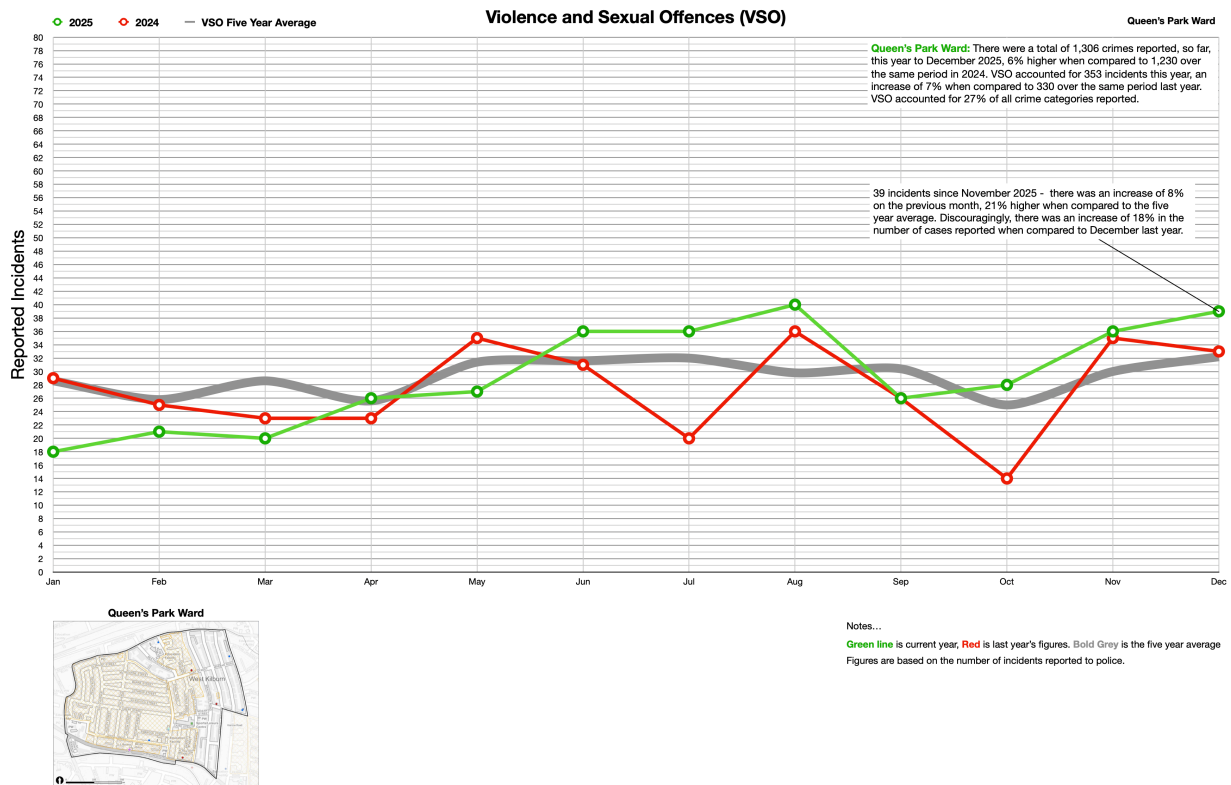
- Green: 2025 (to December)
- Red: 2024: whole year results
- Bold Grey: five-year average

Key Stats:

- 312 incidents Jan–Dec 2025 (↓ 7% vs. 2024)
- 24% of all reported crime
- 17 incidents since November (↓ 0% vs. November 2025, ↓ 15% vs. December 2024)
- 44% lower than five-year average (2020–2024)

Insight: Reported ASB is decreasing compared to historic averages.

Violence & Sexual Offences (VSO)



The chart above illustrate data using the following colour system:

- Green: 2025 (to December)
- Red: 2024: whole year results
- Bold Grey: five-year average

Key Stats:

- 353 incidents Jan–Dec 2025 (↑ 7% vs. 2024)
- 27% of all reported crime
- 39 incidents since November (↑ 8% vs. November 2025, ↑ 18% vs. December 2024)
- 21% higher than five-year average (2020–2024)

Insight: VSO incidents increased overall and remained elevated throughout the second half of the year.
